Choosing abortion

Info on medical vs surgical abortions



A guide to seeking abortion and to help understand which method will suit best

For anyone considering abortion in the NT

- There is no rush in making a decision
- Many people think that there is an upper limit of 12 or 14 weeks to have an abortionthis is no longer the case.
- If a doctor tells you they have ethical reasons for not providing abortion care they have a legal duty to refer you to somebody who will.
- Abortion providers will offer you contraception to prevent further unplanned pregnancy - use the opportunity to ask questions and find a method that's right for you.
- Before an abortion you will need a dating ultrasound. This referral can be arranged through your GP or through Family Planning.

If you have a medicare card, both options are **free**

> If you **do not** have medicare, a medical termination is less expensive

Medical Abortion

- Available up to 9 weeks of pregnancy
- Involves taking two different types of tablets on day 1 and day 3 to cause a termination at home.
- Cramping and bleeding begin after the second tablets (on day 3) and can last for up to 8 hours
- Family Planning provides a pack with pain relief and anti nausea medications
- Follow up can be in person or as a phone call 2 weeks later. You will also have two blood tests during the process (on day 1 and day 7)

Advantages

- Can occur in the comfort of your own home
- Avoids having an operation
- Often able to happen sooner than a surgical termination

Disadvantages

- 5% chance of the abortion not working
- Complications are rare but can include excessive bleeding or infection
- Follow up including blood tests are required to make sure the abortion was successful

Surgical Abortion

- A simple surgical procedure that removes the pregnancy
- Involves most of a day in hospital however the procedure itself usually is short.
- The safest abortion method after 9 weeks
- Requires a sedation to be asleep during the operation.

Advantages

- Can occur in one day with not much follow up required
- You can choose to have an IUD inserted during the procedure if you would like this for long-acting contraception
- Occurs while you are asleep so minimial pain

Disadvantages

- Depending on circumstances some people may need to wait about 4 weeks for an appointment and procedure.
- You need to avoid driving for at least 24 hours after a general anaesthetic
- Involves having an IV drip inserted and being in hospital
